Quarterly Report for April 1, 2006 to June 30, 2006

The SANREM CRSP held its first full Annual Meeting (18-20 April 2006) involving System Coordinators, Bridging PIs, and PIs from the five SANREM CRSP Long-Term Research (LTR) activity teams. Over 50 SANREM partners participated in the meeting. Since the meeting, LTR PIs activity has picked up speed. All long-term research activities are currently underway and project personnel are working with host country partners to implement the long-term research activities. US scientists visited almost all of the host country research sites during the last quarter. A cross-cutting initiative in watershed modeling and remote sensing was also discussed and proposed by the long-term research activities. This activity is currently being planned and will be presented to the technical committee for review and approval.

Over 100 agricultural and environmental scientists and development specialists benefited from practical and constructive discussions at the Biodiversity Conservation in Agriculture Symposium hosted by the SANREM CRSP and IPM CRSP Management Entities at Punta Cana, Dominican Republic (31 May-2 June 2006). Topics explored included the importance of biodiversity and its role in ecosystem services, how biodiversity conservation can be integrated into agricultural development activities and how agricultural development projects can be designed to meet USAID Biodiversity Conservation Earmark requirements.

System Coordinators met to discuss progress in developing chapters for the SANREM CRSP Systems Book and contributing to the SANREM Knowledge Base with information resources relevant to their systems. After an initial review of Part I chapters, some gaps were identified and two additional chapters included in the outline. System Coordinators have begun preparation of their case study chapters. The SANREM Knowledge Base (http://www.ext.vt.edu/cgi-bin/WebObjects/SANREM.woa) is continuing to expand. Bridging Activity research are in the process of concluding.

Other highlights:

The SANREM-Andes Bridging Activity of Dr. Rhoades was featured in a series of radio programs on NPR. A 15-minute special on "Living on Earth" aired on 17 April 2006. These programs describe the social and environmental impacts of glacier retreat in the Andes.

Three host country and 10 US graduate students and 1 host country and 3 US undergraduate students have been supported this year by system coordination, bridging, and planning activities. Bridging Award PIs have been publishing articles and chapters, as well as making presentations at various venues. Weekly meetings are being held with the IPM CRSP to share lessons learned, coordinate, search for synergy and approaches to solutions for common problems.

Significant issues encountered and addressed

- Several SANREM CRSP partners (particularly with respect to survey research components) are passing through their university's Human Subjects Research Review Boards before this research can be fully implemented. This process does not appear to be creating any serious delay in project implementation but is another factor required for project initiation.
- Processing visas for non-US participants to attend the SANREM CRSP Annual Meeting went smoothly in some cases and not so in others. The TraiNet System although technical recognizing non-training related travel for non-US SANREM CRSP PIs, does not process them differently than trainees from the host country. This created a major problem for one of our AVRDC partners (a Pakistani national working at AVRDC in Taiwan) and forced an Ecuadorian site coordinator to pass an unnecessary English proficiency exam. As the TraiNet System continues to mature it improves functioning in some respects, but reinforces unnecessary rigidities in others that will negatively impact the quality and cost of USAID programming without providing additional security. Food safety training for Zambians has been re-programmed due to TraiNet restrictions.
